Welcoming Days of Observance from Dave Becker - <u>December 1st is World AIDS Day</u> — a day for people worldwide to unite in the fight against HIV, to show support for the estimated 38 million people living with HIV, and to commemorate those who have died from an AIDS-related illness. Founded in 1988, World AIDS Day was the first ever global health day. Despite the virus only being identified in 1984, more than 35 million people have died of HIV or AIDS related illnesses. Today, scientific advances have been made in HIV treatment, there are laws to protect people living with HIV, and we understand so much more about the condition. Despite this, stigma and discrimination remain a reality for many people living with the condition. World AIDS Day is important -it reminds the public and government that HIV has not gone away — there is still a vital need to raise money, increase awareness, fight prejudice and improve education. World AIDS Day is an opportunity to show solidarity with the millions of people living with HIV worldwide.

\*December 3<sup>rd</sup> is International Day of Persons with Disabilities. This United Nations holiday raises awareness for the rights of individuals with disabilities. The estimated 1.3 billion persons with disabilities worldwide continue to face systemic discrimination and barriers to their meaningful inclusion in all areas of society. \*<u>December 10<sup>th</sup> is celebrated worldwide as Human Rights Day</u>. The date was chosen to honor the United Nations General Assembly's proclamation (on December 10, 1948) of the Universal Declaration of Human Rights, the first global enunciation of human rights. The day is usually marked by high-level political conferences and by cultural events and exhibitions related to human rights issues. The United Nations Prize in the Field of Human Rights and the Nobel Peace Prize are traditionally awarded on Human Rights Day. \*December 18th is International Migrants Day. This day recognizes the important contribution of migrants while highlighting the challenges they face. Conflict, insecurity, war, and the effects of climate change have contributed to forced movement of people within countries or across borders. In 2020, over 281 million people were international migrants, while over 59 million people were internally displaced by the end of 2021. Since 2014 more than 50,000 migrants have lost their lives on migratory routes around the world. Migrants and displaced people represent some of the most vulnerable and marginalized groups in society, and are often exposed to abuse and exploitation, have limited access to essential services including healthcare, and are faced with xenophobic attacks and stigma fueled by misinformation. Many migrant workers are often in temporary, informal, or unprotected jobs, which exposes them to a greater risk of insecurity, layoffs, and poor working conditions.
